

1. The Library remains open!

Have you been to the Library or even driven past it lately? There are always LOTS of cars in the parking lot and patrons enjoying its facilities and services. OK—Fewer people can be in the Library at one time per the county system mandate. The county authorizes 25% of total occupancy (which includes staff) can be present in the Library. It is less than were allowed a short time ago, but it IS open to 38 people at a time as of this writing.

2. Lobby Books is up and running!

Kid's Corner for grades K-6 — Wednesdays from 5-5:30. The current monthly rotation includes **Read** with a Furry Friend either online or in person in the Reading Garden behind the Library (preregistration required a week ahead); Write On: a creative writing club; Young Artists Workshop with crafts that explore famous artists; and Fairytale Theater: puppet shows. Virtual field trips are also in the works.

AND—look into the Little Buddy program that promotes love of books and reading by pairing a "little buddy" with a "big buddy reader" for a weekly date to read together. Find information on registration here.

FOR TEENS AND TWEENS—Teens earn volunteer teens hours with the Teen Leadership Council that

meets the third Thursday of each month virtually via <u>Discord</u>.


Bakers & Makers led by one of the Teen Leadership Council members—meets third Saturday each month at 2:00. Teens and tweens will either participate in a baking or craft activity with ingredient or material kits being available for pick up at the library starting one week prior to the program date.

High School Book Club for ages 15-19 meets monthly (exact dates TBD) outdoors after school in the reading garden behind the library (limited numbers ensure social distancing). Another of the Teen Leadership Council members who chooses the book to read and discuss each month leads this group. (Once we are able to meet indoors, we will add a middle school book club as well.) Centennial Celebration crafts ahead— Monthly kits available at the Library while supplies last!


- September—the 2000s—Make a Safe Stopping Smart Car, a STEM-based activity kit for family fun AND celebrate Hispanic Heritage Month with a kit inspired by Pura Belpre, the first Latina librarian at New York Public Library.
- October—2010s—Dias de los Muertos: create a STEM activity Bone Bridge. Adults and teens engage with making Sugar Skull suncatchers. More kits and fun—see Gulf Coast Reads activities just below.
- November—2020s—NaNoWriMo!: use a Storytelling kit to encourage writing AND make a challenging STEM Turkey Run maze with a kit.
